

City Efforts

In keeping with Citizen Survey results, the City of Auburn continues to work to protect and improve the local job market, transportation infrastructure, city services and the local quality of life. Recent and current efforts include:

- The City of Auburn estimates significant job creation over time in its newest 430-acre technology park, Auburn Technology Park West.
- The City is currently working with the Alabama Department of Transportation on Exit 50, Auburn's forthcoming new Interstate 85 interchange. This interchange will enhance the attractiveness of Auburn Technology Park West to prospective industries, and will provide additional economic development opportunity for the Community. Federal funding has been made available to assist with this project.
- The City is also implementing plans to extend West Veterans Boulevard in an effort to improve traffic and better provide access to local technology parks. Some Federal funding has also been made available for West Veterans Boulevard.
- In concert with the City of Opelika and Lee County, the City of Auburn helped secure funds to build the new terminal at the Auburn University Regional Airport. This two-story, 26,000 square foot,

state-of-the-art facility is expected to be completed in July and should draw business and commerce. The Airport is an important component of the areas' economic development efforts and potential.

- The City of Auburn has used Federal funding through the COPS grant program in working to develop and install a Wireless Mobile Data system for Police vehicles. There are currently 50 wireless mesh access points that provide on-site data to 72 mobile data terminals in police vehicles. This wireless system allows police officers access to information and reports previously only available at the police station. Patrol units equipped with this system can increase efficiency by maintaining their availability in the field. The City of Auburn is continuing to enhance this system.
- The National Arbor Day Foundation has recognized the City of Auburn as a Tree City USA for the last 25 years. The Auburn Tree Commission advises the City on proper tree care and planting, and is committed to the growth and preservation of the urban tree canopy. The City's Parks and Recreation Department includes expert employees in Beautification and Urban Forestry to help maintain attractive greenspace and landscaping throughout the City.
- The City of Auburn has plans to expand its bicycle network and improve the safety and convenience of alternative modes of travel. The City Council's commitment to funding bicycle paths has been strong, with over 30 miles of existing bike and multi-use paths available in the City and almost 120 miles proposed for the future. A Bicycle Plan was included in the City's Auburn 2020 visioning document, and the cycling community continues to be influential in related planning efforts. Every fourth grader in the city participates in the school system's bicycle safety program.
- The City recently worked with Auburn University on the "Travel with Care" campaign to educate and raise awareness for good safety practices. Recent and planned safety improvements include LED lighting and improved signage at mid-block crosswalks on Magnolia Avenue, improved lighting on Magnolia Avenue and the removal of sidewalk aprons that do not lead to crosswalks. Additional transportation safety campaigns will be held in the future.
- The City is continuously working to improve infrastructure and services through street resurfacing. Recent rehabilitation work has been performed to maintain the City's sewer system. The City's recycling program continues to evolve with six new recycling locations available to the public throughout the downtown area.

Auburn will continue to be guided by the citizens in developing budget and project priorities as we strive to maintain a quality of life that

Auburn City Pools Open

Auburn City Pool season passes are available at the Dean Road Recreation Center. Individual passes are \$50.00 and family passes are \$100.00. Daily admission is \$2.00 per person (Children 1 year old and younger are free). The City operates two pools: Samford Pool, which is located



at 328 Samford Avenue (behind Auburn Junior High School) and Drake Pool, which is located at 653 Spencer Avenue (behind Drake Middle School). Samford Pool will be closed several days throughout the summer due to swimming and diving meets. Closing times and schedule changes will be posted at the pool, Dean Road Recreation Center and online at www.auburnalabama.org/parks.

Airport Terminal Nearing Completion

Standing two stories tall and 26,000 square feet in size, the new Auburn University Regional Airport Terminal is expected to help Auburn and the surrounding communities soar to new heights. The airport is an important tool for Economic Development recruitment in the region. The new terminal has all the amenities of a modern-day airport, far surpassing the original terminal that was built in 1950. "We weren't a first-class facility that could take care of the needs of the public in terms of modern-day aviation," said Airport Director Bill Hutto about why the renovation project was needed.

Construction on the project began last summer, and crews are expected to complete finishing touches sometime in July. The terminal will have state-of-the-art features, complete with a large lobby, flight planning room, board room, pilots lounge, and a vending area. Funding for the \$10 million project was provided by local governments - Auburn, Opelika and Lee County. State appropriations were also secured by State Representative Mike Hubbard to build the roadway that connects the terminal to Bent Creek Road.

The City of Auburn expects that the improvements to the airport will help draw business and commerce to the area. An Open House for the public will be scheduled this fall.

Auburn Police Launch New Tip Line

The Auburn Police Division has a new anonymous tip line. Citizens can call the new tip line number at 334-246-1391. The phone line will handle both voice and text messages. According to Auburn's Acting Police Chief Tommy Dawson, the tip line has proven successful in helping to solve cases in the past, and should be even more successful in the future with the added capability to receive text messages. "We rely on the extra eyes and



ears of the community, and could not do what we do without the support of our citizens," Chief Dawson said. Police note that things like a suspect's description, vehicle description, tag number, direction of travel, and other details are very important. "When you see something suspicious, give us a call immediately," said Chief Dawson. "The sooner we can get officers into the area, the better our chances are of apprehending the offender," he adds. In addition to the new tip line, the non-emergency line is still available at 501-3100. As always, citizens should call 911 in case of emergency.

Auburn Public Safety Enforces Fire Hydrant Ordinance

The City of Auburn Public Safety Department reminds residents that Section 507.5.5 of the International Fire Code, adopted by the Auburn City Council on January 19, 2010, requires a 3foot clear space around the circumference of all fire hydrants within the City. Residents should remove any plants or shrubbery within 3-feet of their fire hydrants.


