## Your Voice in Auburn's City Government 2011 Citizen Survey Coming Soon

On many occasions surveys are conducted to provide beneficial information to a business or an academic study, but this spring the City of Auburn will conduct its annual survey designed to benefit you. The Citizen Survey is the primary tool used to provide the Auburn City Council with a clear vision of citizen needs.

The City's Annual Citizen Survey offers citizens a valuable venue through which they can communicate their concerns to the Auburn City Council. Now in its twenty-fourth year, the survey plays an influential role in formulating the City's budget and project priorities, both short and long-term. The survey gives direction to City Administrators on improving City services for Auburn citizens. Survey results consistently show strong citizen support for Auburn City Schools. As a result, the City of Auburn dedicates 13% of the City's general fund budget in support of Auburn's public schools. These funds play a crucial role in helping Auburn City Schools maintain its status as a quality, nationally ranked school system. Additional initiatives in response to past Citizen Surveys have included increased neighborhood traffic enforcement, and a continued focus on improving the City's infrastructure.


The 2011 Citizen Survey will be administered by mail beginning January 16. Citizens who receive a survey are asked to take a few moments to fill it out, and return it in the postage-paid envelope. Citizens unable to return the survey by mail will receive a telephone follow-up survey, providing them with an additional opportunity to participate. Your involvement is vital in communicating your priorities to Auburn's elected officials.

## GE Aviation To Build Facility in Auburn

Auburn will soon be home to a GE Aviation manufacturing facility. General Electric (GE) has selected Auburn as the site for a new environmental coatings facility for advanced military jet engine components. GE selected Auburn based on the area's access to a strong technical workforce, local government support, employee training opportunities, and close proximity to Auburn University.

GE Aviation, a GE operating unit based in Cincinnati, Ohio, is a world-leading supplier of commercial and mil-

recognition as a great place to live, work and do business," said Mayor Bill Ham. "We've seen local industry expand and new industry join our community. An announcement like this can't be made without thanks to Governor Riley and Representative Hubbard, thanks to Dr. Gogue and Auburn University for what they bring to the community, and thanks to Auburn's Economic Development team for their tireless work to keep Auburn's economy strong," Ham added.

Construction of the new 200,000 square-foot facility will begin in 2011 at Auburn Technology Park West, and the facility is expected to open in 2012. The facility will enhance components for the GE/Rolls-Royce F136 jet engine for the Joint Strike Fighter (JSF) F-35 program (the Department of Defense's focal point for defining affordable next generation strike aircraft weapon systems for the Navy, Air Force, and Marines). Initial F136 production will start in 2013.

"This is a great win for citizens of Auburn, Lee County and the state of Alabama," said State Representative Mike Hubbard. He continued, "GE Aviation's decision to locate in Auburn brings more jobs to the East Alabama area, as we continue to outperform a sluggish national economy. This location is a testament to the strength of Alabama and to the quality of the greater Auburn community".

## **Improving Traffic Flow in Auburn**

The City of Auburn's Public Works Department has been working hard to improve traffic flow around town. In August, a new traffic signal was installed at the intersection of North College Street and Shelton Mill Road. This installation was funded in part by a private development. The new intersection features pedestrian signals to enhance the safety of pedestrians and children walking to and from Cary Woods Elementary School. New countdown pedestrian signals are scheduled to be installed at several downtown intersections.

At the end of summer, staff completed a project to optimize traffic signal timings around the Village Mall area. The five intersections around the mall were coordinated with radio communication so that the signals work together to move traffic as one unit through the mall corridor. This system is programmed to reduce delays and improve the overall travel time for motorists. Additionally, the left turn signals at the Opelika Road intersection with East University Drive were altered to allow motorists to yield and make a left turn on green. Previously, motorists had to wait for a green arrow to proceed left through the intersection.

Similar enhancements have been completed at the intersection of South Donahue Drive and East University Drive where left turn signals were installed to provide protected left turns. These improvements were finalized in November.

From ongoing improvements in street signs and traffic signals, to the "Travel with Care" safety campaign and pedestrian improvements on Magnolia Avenue, employees of the Traffic Engineer-

ing division of the Public Works department are dedicated to providing citizens with the best possible traffic conditions and infrastructure for all modes of travel.



## **Maintaining the Public Right of Way**

In the City of Auburn, the public right-of-way is used for providing water service lines, sanitary sewer lines, storm water runoff, sidewalks, street widening, electric utilities, gas utilities, phone lines, cable television lines and other items as needed for public use (State of Alabama Code Section 11-47-171). Along most streets, the right-of-way extends beyond the back of the curb for several feet. The best way for a homeowner to know where the right-ofway begins and ends is to locate the property survey pins for the lot. Anything on the street side of the property pins is within the public right-of-way. If the property pins are not easily located, look for the water meter and utility poles. Both of these are normally placed within the right-of-way. Citizens may view subdivision plats at the office of the City Engineer, 171 North Ross Street, to get a general idea of the width of the right of way abutting their property. The City has responsibility to maintain the City services that are within the right-of-way. Public sector utilities such as Alabama Power, and authorized private sector companies such as AT&T, Charter Communications and Knology, are permitted to work within the right-of-way to maintain their services.

Homeowners often plant flowers, trees and shrubs within the right-of-way or next to the public right-of-way. This practice can cause safety concerns when branches and leaves limit the site distance needed for vehicle operators to safely enter or exit a roadway. The City must make repairs to services located in the right-of-way when needed. The City may remove any item that is placed within the right of way. Homeowners who plan to construct a fence, flower bed, wall, irrigation system, or other appurtenance should check to make sure that the construction will fall within their property limits and not on the public right-of-way. ## **License Reminders**

## Federal and State Employees Working in Auburn

Generally, every person working in Auburn is subject to the City's occupation license fee. The occupation license fee is 1% of an employee's gross wages, which is withheld by employers and then paid to the City on a quarterly basis. Self-employed individuals pay a business license fee instead of the occupation license fee.

The federal government does not withhold occupation license fees (OCC) from the gross wages of federal employees who work in Auburn. Federal employees are required to pay OCC to the City individually. Similarly, State employees who are not based in Auburn, but who work in Auburn from time to time, are subject to the OCC ordinance. The State does not withhold OCC from State employees' pay for the time that they work in Auburn. It is therefore the responsibility of the State employees who fall into this category to individually pay OCC to the City.

All federal and State employees working in Auburn should be aware that they are subject to the occupation license fee requirement, with payments required to be made each quarter (by January 31, April 30, July 31 and October 31). Federal and State employees can obtain the license fee filing form online at <a href="https://www.auburnalabama.org/fi">www.auburnalabama.org/fi</a> or by contacting the City's Revenue Office at 334-501-7239. The City is committed to collecting all the City taxes and license fees that are due from every taxpayer.

## **Reflective Clothing Helps Prevent Accidents**

Residents who bicycle, jog, or walk between dusk and dawn need to wear reflective material in order to be visible to automobile drivers. City Ordinance 1272 requires bicyclists, walkers, and joggers to wear reflective clothing from one-half hour before sunset until one-half hour before sunrise. This reflective material must be worn between the waist and shoulders on the front and back. In addition, all bicyclists must have an operating headlight on the front of their bicycles and reflectors on the spokes of the front and rear wheels and pedals.

If the maintenance issue is not addressed within two weeks of placing the call, contact the City of Auburn's Traffic Engineer, Brandy Ezelle, at 501-3000 for help in determining the cause of the delay.
