Route Changes for Trash, Recycling and Debris Pickup

The City of Auburn Environmental Services Department will implement route changes this summer to help reduce costs by increasing efficiency and reducing fuel usage. Approximately two-thirds of current customers will be affected by the routing change. Throughout July, information will be distributed door-to-door to those customers whose route will change, with the new routing schedule going into effect on August 1, 2011.

Over the past decade, the number of customers receiving weekly garbage, recycling and yard waste collection has grown by almost a third. To accommodate this growth, the City's residential solid waste collection system has evolved from a manual labor-intensive collection operation to one that utilizes automated trucks for household garbage collection, specialized recycling vehicles for curbside recycling service and knuckle boom loaders for bulky/yard debris collection. These advances in collection equipment have helped the Environmental Services Department run lean, with only 31 collection employees providing garbage, recycling and yard waste services for approximately 12,563 customers weekly. Despite a growth of approximately 4,000 customers in the past decade, the Environmental Services Department hasn't increased its collection workforce since 2001.

The new routes, developed jointly by extensive collaborative efforts between the City's IT Department – GIS Division and the Environmental Services Department, will allow collection crews to better serve Auburn's citizens. A similar route study was done by the IT Department - GIS Division and the Public Safety Department - Fire Division in 2007 to ensure that Fire vehicles arrived at emergency calls as quickly and efficiently as possible.

ton and then click on the "Public Services Map". The map will allow users to locate any address and not only find out which day the garbage is collected but also which school zone, voting location, voting ward, fire zone, and City Council member is associated with that address.



2011 Citizens Planning Academy

The City of Auburn's Planning Department will begin its third offering of the Citizens Planning Academy on Thursday, September 15th, 2011. It is open to all Auburn residents. Classes will be held in the Development Services Building Conference Room at 171 North Ross Street. The course will consist of six (6) sessions held on Thursday evenings from 5:30 pm to 7:00 pm, beginning September 15 and ending on October 27(excluding Thursday, October 6).

The City's Planning Department carries out comprehensive planning, regulatory planning and data management and research. Comprehensive Planning addresses long range planning goals that relate to all services provided by the City. The department engages in comprehensive planning both within the City limits and in outlying areas regulated by the City's subdivision requirements. The Planning Department has developed an Auburn Interactive Growth Model (AIGM), which serves as the basis for future land use planning decisions. Regulatory Planning includes all work associated with the administration of the City's zoning ordinance and subdivision regulations. Data Management and Research involves the maintenance of several databases including demographic information and address updates for the decennial census, as well as zoning and land use data for the City of Auburn GIS.

Participants in the academy will learn the basics of planning and how different departments, developers and individuals interact in the planning process. The City of Auburn's Comprehensive Plan and other ongoing projects will also be discussed. Other topics include Planning in Auburn (Requirements and responsibilities of the Planning Department), The Roles and Responsibilities of Auburn's Boards and Commissions, Long-Range Planning, The Role of Other City Departments in Planning, A Professional Engineer's View on Planning in Auburn, Auburn University Campus Planning, Historic Preservation, Zoning Enforcement and Online Resources.

Going on Summer Vacation?

If your summer plans include a family vacation, be sure to protect your home and its contents while you are out of town. The Auburn Police Division has a number of safety tips for residents traveling out of town. The most important and easiest safety precaution you can take is to lock your doors and windows. According to the Police Division, unsecured door and window locks are the #1 cause of home burglaries in Auburn. Before traveling out of town, be sure to contact the Police Division and ask that your home be placed on a "House Check" list for extra patrol. Avoiding Mosquito Bites

The Environmental Services Department of the City of Auburn provides mosquito control services by citizen request. For isolated problems, an evaluation is scheduled to assess the situation. For widespread problems, where the use of a truck-mounted sprayer is necessary, notice will be provided to alert the area of the spray schedule. Notification is typically accomplished via signage placed at stop signs, intersections, etc. on the morning prior to the scheduled spray event. Spraying is done during the late evening/night hours in an attempt to maximize the effect on the mosquito population while minimizing the effect on the human population.

Residents are reminded that wearing mosquito repellent will help reduce the risk of being bitten. Repellents with the chemical "DEET" (diethyl toluamide) are effective in reducing mosquito bites and are recommended by the Alabama Department of Public Health. The City's mosquito program is coordinated with assistance from the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Auburn University's Entomology and Plant Pathology Department. Auburn High Senior Wins Poetry Competition, Meets President Obama

Auburn citizens have yet another national champion in their midst. Auburn High School senior Youssef Biaz won the 2011 Poetry Out Loud National Poetry Recitation Contest in Washington, DC. Biaz advanced to the national contest from a field of more than 365,000 students who tested their skills in poetry recitation in more than 2,000 schools nationwide. To become the national champion, Biaz competed against 53 students from other states, the District of Columbia, the Virgin Islands, Guam and Puerto Rico.

Biaz, the two-time Alabama state champion, won the national contest by reciting the poem *Filling Station* by Elizabeth Bishop. As a result, Biaz earned a \$20,000 college scholarship, and the Auburn High School library received a \$500 stipend for the purchase of poetry books

The poetry winner was invited to recite Bishop's poem for President Barack Obama on Wednesday, May 11. The Auburn City Council also recognized Biaz and commended his outstanding achievement at the May 17 City Council meeting. The Auburn High School graduate plans to attend film school at the University of Southern California.



Now in its sixth year of national competition, Poetry Out Loud is a partnership between the National Endowment for the Arts and the Poetry Foundation, which encourages the study of great poetry by offering educational materials and a recitation competition to high school students. Poetry Out Loud gives students an opportunity to master public speaking skills, build self-confidence and learn about their literary heritage.

Youssef's achievement is one of many examples of excellence that can be found in the students and faculty of Auburn City Schools.

Speeding in Neighborhoods

We all notice when we see someone speeding in our neighborhood, but no one is quite as aware of a speeder as a parent keeping an eye on children as they play outside. Drivers should always operate a motor vehicle within the speed limit, but we should all be especially aware in neighborhoods where cyclists, pedestrians and children are more likely to be present.

At higher speeds, motorists are not as likely to see a pedestrian and cannot stop as quickly if they see a child or pedestrian unexpectedly in the road. Statistics show that the chances of death or serious injury rise dramatically with increased speed, with a pedestrian facing a 5% chance of death if struck by a vehicle traveling 20 mph, a 45% chance of death at 30 mph, and an 85% chance of death if the vehicle is traveling 40 mph.

Those who are guilty of neighborhood speeding can typically be found speeding in their own neighborhood. Be considerate to your neighbors and their peace of mind by slowing down. Keep your eyes on the road at all times, slow down once you enter a neighborhood and watch out for children at play. Watch closely for stop signs, pedestrian signs and signs indicating the presence of children. Remember children do not always watch out for motor vehicles so you must watch out for them.
