## 15th Annual Mayor's Memorial Day Breakfast

Mayor Bill Ham, Jr. and the Auburn Veterans Committee cordially invite you to attend the 15th Annual Mayor's Memorial Day Breakfast on Monday, May 27 at 8 a.m. at the Hotel at Auburn University and Dixon Conference Center. This annual event is held to honor the United States Military and those soldiers who have made the supreme sacrifice. Tickets for the breakfast are available at City Hall for \$25 each or \$250 for a table of 10. Proceeds from ticket sales go to the Auburn Veterans Memorial Fund.

Norm Caldwell will be the guest of honor and the recipient of the 2013



City of Auburn Distinguished Veteran Award. Caldwell began his military career at the age of 17 while a high school senior, and entered the Navy upon graduating. His first assignment after training would lead him to Pearl Harbor where he supported combat fighters as a Navy metalsmith after the attack by the Japanese. Caldwell relocated to Auburn in the mid 80's along with his employer, the Sommer Metalcraft Corporation of Indiana. In Auburn, he became an active community leader as a board member on the Industrial Development Board. Caldwell later retired from his position, but continued his work with the City and its recruiting efforts as Chairman of the Board. Today, the Auburn Chamber of Commerce recognizes his contributions with the Norm Caldwell Industrialist of the Year Award.

This year marks the second year the Auburn Heroes Remembered Award will be presented in honor of a local distinguished veteran who has passed away. This year's Auburn Heroes Remembered Award will honor two distinguished veterans within the same family. Lieutenant General Lewis A. Pick and Colonel Lewis A. Pick, Jr. are part of a family that has called Auburn home since 1923. The fingerprints of the Pick family's legacy are visible throughout Auburn, and this year's Auburn Heroes Remembered Award will allow the community to see the family's history of military service and sacrifice. Lieutenant General Lewis A. Pick, Sr. fought in World War I and World War II and is a Distinguished Service Medal recipient. Colonel Lewis A. Pick, Jr. fought in the Korean War in the Field Artillery, 3rd Infantry Division, transferred to the Army Corps of Engineers assigned to Germany and Vietnam, and ultimately served as Troop Commander and Executive Officer to the Assistant Secretary of the Army for Civil Works.

Immediately following the breakfast, at 10 a.m., the City of Auburn will hold a memorial wreath laying ceremony at the Auburn Veterans Memorial Monument, located at the northeast corner of Ross Street and Glenn Avenue. Ceremony attendees are encouraged to park at the Douglas J. Watson Municipal Complex and Felton Little Park. During the ceremony, Ross Street will be closed from Glenn Avenue to Harper Avenue to allow for parking for the disabled.

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#### **Smart Yards Incentive Program Helps Reduce Stormwater Runoff**

With recent rain systems moving through the area and showers undoubtedly on the way, it's an ideal time for residents to assess their yard's drainage. The presence of heavy storm water runoff can cause unsightly soil erosion and carry pollutants into local creeks, streams, and rivers. The City of Auburn's Water Resource Management Department has joined forces with the Saugahatchee Watershed Management Plan (SWaMP) to implement the Smart Yards Incentive Program, which assists in funding landscaping projects to improve storm water management.

The Saugahatchee Watershed Management Plan was started in 2007 with grant assistance. The SWaMP program focuses on the installation of projects and public education efforts to clean up Saugahatchee Creek, sections of which have been on the Alabama Department of Environmental Management's list of impaired waterways since the mid-1990's.

The Smart Yards Incentive Program helps fund up to 60% of the cost of pre-approved projects that are designed to minimize erosion and intercept pollutants being carried into local streams during storms. Potential projects include rain gardens, stream bank restoration projects, repair of badly eroded areas and installation of rainwater systems.

During its first year of operation, the Smart Yards Incentive Program assisted with numerous projects in Auburn. All of these projects have implemented practical steps that minimize erosion and act to intercept pollutants before they can be flushed into local streams during storm events.



Rain gardens have been especially popular since they can be constructed in various shapes and sizes. Size and placement must fit specific soil types and landscaping. Benefits of a properly installed rain garden include intercepting storm water run-

off and the pollutants it carries; treating pollutants with rain garden plants and soil mixture; recharging the groundwater

through infiltration of storm water into the soil; preventing erosion of the landscape by lessening the volume and force of storm water runoff; and preventing stream bank erosion by lessening the volume and force of stormwater entering streams.

If you see excess stormwater runoff eroding your landscape, you may be a good candidate for a rain garden. If you are considering installing a rain garden, check out the rain garden construction guidelines in the Alabama Smart Yards manual at www.swamp.auburn.edu, or contact Eve Brantley at brantef@auburn.edu for more information. ## City Grants Trash Amnesty May 20-24

Spring cleaning doesn't get much easier than during Trash Amnesty Week, set aside each spring by the City of Auburn. During the week of May 20-24, 2013, the fees normally assessed to Auburn residents for the collection of oversized yard debris and other bulky waste will be waived.

Citizens are asked to pay close attention to the following guidelines when placing items out for collection:

• Debris should be placed at the curb no later than 6:00 a.m. on your regularly scheduled collection day. Please avoid placing items on or near mailboxes, utility boxes or poles, or other fixed objects. All items should be properly contained or bundled so they do not fall into the street or down storm drains.

• The City will accept yard waste, appliances, and bulky items for collection. No household garbage, hazardous

waste, or other unacceptable waste should be placed out for collection with debris.

• Debris should not be placed in the roadway, on or around storm drains, near utility lines, on utility boxes, or on vacant lots.

• Limbs and other debris should be no longer than 5 feet in length.

• To facilitate wood debris and metal recycling efforts, please separate all wood debris, including limbs and grass clippings from metal items.

Due to the large volume of debris expected during Trash Amnesty Week, citizens may experience a delay in their collection schedule. Every reasonable effort will be made to maintain the established collection schedule.

#### Neighborhood Cleanup Event Scheduled for May 13-17

In conjunction with Keep Auburn Beautiful, the City of Auburn will host a Neighborhood Clean-Up event during the week of May 13-17 to spruce up Lakeview Drive, McKinley Avenue and Old Mill Road. Several City departments will work to remove bulky/yard debris placed on the street for collection, mow vegetation and collect litter along the rights of way, repair sidewalks, potholes and other street problems, replace worn street signage, paint fire hydrants, conduct code enforcement surveys of property, and plant trees on residential property to help beautify and enhance the tree canopy.
