2013 Citizen Survey Results Released

The results of the 2013 Citizen Survey were presented to the Auburn City Council at the Tuesday, April 16, Council meeting, with residents giving high marks to City services, the overall value received for their tax dollar and the quality of life in Auburn.

"You're clearly setting the standard for other cities," said Chris Tatham, President of the ETC Institute. During the presentation, Tatham focused on satisfaction with the quality of city services (83% satisfied, 27 points above the

national average) and satisfaction with the value received for taxes and fees (77% satisfied, 30 points above the national average) calling them two of the most important measures in gauging the "health of city government."

Tatham called satisfaction with the value received for taxes "tremendous," and "a new high" in ETC's city surveys. "In most communities, fewer than half the residents give positive ratings. Here in Auburn, 77% feel good about what they're paying for their taxes and fees given the value that they get. Only 8% are dissatisfied," said Tatham. "So for every person that complains that you're not providing good value for their taxes, there are 10 people out there that actually think the exact opposite."

The survey compares results to previous years and to the national average, showing that Auburn's ratings improved or stayed the same in 59 areas since 2006, improved or stayed the same in 50 areas over last year and exceeded the national average in 57 areas. Trend analysis showed no long-term, statistically significant declines in ratings since 2006.

This year's survey showed that city leaders should continue to prioritize traffic flow management and the maintenance of city streets and facilities. The survey also highlighted local concerns about the appearance of Opelika Road and the availability of downtown parking.

"I took a look at some of the plans you have upcoming, things with parking in downtown, improvements to Opelika Road, Parks and Recreation issues you're taking a look at, they resonate very closely with the needs and expectations you see in the survey," said Tatham.

On quality of life issues, 95% of residents indicated that they are "satisfied" or "very satisfied" with Auburn as a place to live and raise children. 94% were satisfied with the quality of local schools, placing satisfaction with Auburn City Schools 31 points above the national average.

This year marks the City of Auburn's 26<sup>th</sup> consecutive annual survey and the 10<sup>th</sup> administered by the ETC Institute, a Kansas based research firm. The results give city leaders a scientific measure of the priorities of the community as a whole and are used in the formulation of budget and project priorities.

#### **Auburn City Schools Student Artwork to Mark Storm Drains**

Five Auburn City Schools students were recognized by Auburn Mayor Bill Ham, Jr. recently for contributing art designs selected to mark 1,000 storm drains in Auburn. Designs by Kathryn Duffield, Lindsay Evermon, Rachel Robinson, Kendal Black and Soojin Park were chosen from approximately 250 entries.

The work of Auburn City Schools students currently marks about 1,400 of more than 3,100 local storm drains. With mes-

sages like "Don't Dump!" and "Only Rain Goes Down the Drain," the storm drain markers remind residents that storm drains route water directly to rivers and streams, making it vital not to accidentally or purposefully allow chemicals or debris into the storm drain system.

The Storm Drain Marker program has been a true community effort. The City of Auburn has received assistance in installing the storm drain markers from the Auburn University Student Government Association, Auburn University Service Learning courses, Auburn City Schools JROTC, the Jr. Civitans and local residents.

#### Building the Future Through the Past, Brick by Brick...

Honor the military service of a friend or loved one by etching their memory in stone through the City's Veterans Memorial Park Brick Program. For a \$100 tax-deductible contribution per brick, you can help honor the men and women who have dedicated service to protecting America's freedom.

The Veterans Memorial Park is located at the corner of Ross Street and Glenn Avenue and serves as the site of the City's Annual Veterans Day Celebration. The featured element of the memorial is a 15-foot high obelisk, positioned centrally in the park and surrounded by brick pavers bearing the names of veterans who have been either geographically or genealogically tied to Auburn or its residents, respectively.

Each brick ordered will be engraved to your specifications. The brick will include the name, rank, branch of service, and the dates of service by the honored or memorialized veteran.

Order forms should be accompanied by a \$100 payment and should be received by mail or in person by June 28, 2013 at Auburn City Hall, 144 Tichenor Avenue, Suite 2, Auburn, AL 36830.
