Downtown Parking

Parking just got a little easier in downtown Auburn with the opening of the new Gay Street parking lot, located on Gay Street between Magnolia Avenue and Glenn Avenue. Completed in late 2013, the new parking lot adds 93 conveniently located spaces to the downtown parking inventory, bringing on-street parking as well as improved landscaping, lighting and pedestrian facilities to this section of downtown. The parking lot can also double as event space, thereby reducing the num-

ber of downtown street closings throughout the year. The pre-Iron Bowl edition of the Auburn Chamber of Commerce's "Downtown Autumn Nights" was the inaugural event for the new parking lot.

The Gay Street lot features enhanced lighting for added security and employs a new parking meter system with electronic parking kiosks stationed throughout the lot. Parking spaces are individually numbered, and downtown visitors and workers can pay to park using any kiosk by entering the parking space number and method of payment. Kiosks will accept cash, coin or credit, but cannot provide change. The Gay Street lot is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week with payment required to park weekdays between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.; the same as other metered parking downtown. Parking in the Gay Street lot costs \$.25 an hour with a four-hour time limit.

The parking lot is the result of a long term planning process with

significant citizen input. In the city's Annual Citizen Survey, residents regularly identify downtown parking as a priority need, and citizens approved the funding source for the project in a 2012 referendum. Future downtown parking, traffic flow needs and other downtown improvements are being contemplated by the Downtown Master Plan process, which is currently in its public input phase. The Auburn Public Library strives to provide the Auburn community with programs and services that inform, inspire and connect. At the Library, we want to help our patrons find the information resources that they need and to play a role in making Auburn the wonderful place that it is to live, work, learn and play.

Inform: In 2013, the Auburn Public Library spent \$136,737 on books and media for the library collection. In that same time, patrons borrowed 237,148 books, audiobooks, ebooks and movies from the Auburn Public Library. If Auburn residents had individually purchased a copy of every item borrowed, they would have spent a total of \$3,400,851.69, a literal wealth of information available with your library card and a tremendous return on investment. Additionally,



last year, the Library received a \$20,000 collection development grant to expand its DVD collection. Through this grant, the Library has acquired almost 800 critically-acclaimed movies, TV series, and educational films. The Library also continues to update and expand its collection of print materials, so that patrons can have access to the latest bestsellers and the most current, relevant information resources possible.

Inspire: The Auburn Public Library offers a wide range of programs for children, teens, and adults. These programs include story times for babies, toddlers, and preschoolers, as well as our Summer Reading Program for children and teens. Through these programs, children, teens and young adults develop and improve their literacy skills. It is the goal of our passionate library staff to help young people succeed in school and life, while inspiring a love of reading and learning. For adults, the library offers genealogy classes, book clubs, and other activities that support lifelong learning. Over 14,000 children, teens, and adults attended library programs in FY 2013.



Connect: The Auburn Public Library provides a number of technology resources for our patrons. The Library has 44 public computers with high-speed internet, Microsoft Office, and printing capability. In FY 2013, library patrons logged into our public computers 91,880 times for every-thing from checking email to applying for jobs to completing assignments for school. Our trained professional staff provides one-on-one training on basic computer skills, as well as personal assistance with tablets and e-readers.

At the Auburn Public Library, we are very excited about a number of new services, resources and activities in the works for 2014. The Library is partnering with the Lee County Literacy Coalition to offer drop-in tutoring for adults

Economic development projects will be funded by the Section 108 Loan Guarantee Program. The Economic Development Department (Community Development Division) is accepting applications for a Micro-Loan program in an effort to create/retain jobs principally benefiting employees in low to moderate-income levels. The City will be offering short-term loans for active small businesses and small business start-ups with the ultimate goal for entrepreneurs to become financially independent and eligible for loans from commercial lenders. Economic development loans will only be available to businesses operating in the City limits of Auburn.

Funding for housing and public service projects will be available during the CDBG 2014 program year beginning June 1, 2014. The CDBG program is administered by the Community Development Division.
