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#### 'AA+' Standard & Poor's Rating Affirmed

In January 2014, Standard & Poor's (S&P) affirmed the City of Auburn's bond rating as 'AA+'. In their report, S&P cites strong management, as well as Auburn's "consistently strong financial profile, indicated by its very strong budgetary flexibility and liquidity" as factors that were considered in the rating. Another factor that led to the S&P AA+ rating was Auburn's status as the "key participant in the Auburn-Opelika metropolitan statistical area, indicating its presence as a regional economic center."

According to S&P, an 'AA+' rating indicates a "strong capacity to meet financial commitments." In addition to the strong S&P rating, the City of Auburn holds a rating of AA2 from Moody's Investors Service (Moody's). The Moody's report for Auburn reports "continued diversification and growth of the city's sizable tax base...the city's solid financial position" and a "strong management team" as factors helping Auburn earn an AA2.

Credit ratings are important indicators of a municipality's ability and willingness to meet its debt obligations. A strong credit rating directly correlates to the cost of borrowing. The better the rating, the lower the interest rate will be for City borrowings. This lower interest rate provides savings to the City and its citizens. An analysis of a few of the City's most recent borrowings show savings of up to 1% in interest costs as a result of a strong credit rating. For each \$5 million borrowing (20 year term), over 1/2 million dollars in interest could be saved over the life of the borrowing.

#### **Auburn Recognized for Quality of Life**

Auburn is once again getting media attention for its local quality of life. Forbes.com has ranked Auburn on its list of Top 25 Best Places to Retire in 2014. Forbes cited a cost of living that is 11% below the national average as a factor in the ranking. Other quality-of-life factors considered by Forbes include a strong economy, warm climate, housing prices and a low crime rate.

This Forbes ranking follows a number of previous recognitions from Forbes and other national media and commercial outlets hailing Auburn's quality of life, economic strength and other positive factors.

Other 2014 recognitions so far include Movoto.com, a real estate web site, which placed Auburn at number one on its list of Top Ten Best Places in Alabama. The firm pointed to Auburn's short commute time, low studentteacher ratio and high median household value as factors that launched Auburn to the top of the list.

Commercial website Lumosity.com ranked Au-

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burn/Opelika in the top 50 on its 2013 list of "Smartest Cities," based on data collected from users of their "cognitive training exercises."

In 2013 Auburn was named the "#10 Best Small City for Jobs in the U.S." and the #18 "Best Small Place for Business and Careers," both by Forbes.com. In 2012, recognitions included the Forbes #17 "Best Small Place for Business and Careers in the U.S." and the NewGeography.com 64<sup>th</sup> "Best Small City for Job Growth in the U.S."

Auburn has received other rankings and recognitions over the years including recognition by Southern Living as "One of the South's Best College Towns," a BusinessWeek ranking as the "Best Affordable Place in Alabama," and Forbes "#1 in Projected Job Growth in the U.S."

Auburn has also been named in U.S. News & World Report's "Top 10 Best Places to Live in the U.S." and as "A Great Place to Live" by the Today Show.

Each of these recognitions highlight a different aspect of the Auburn community, but the focus has clearly been on quality of life, strength of the local economy and job market. These national recognitions help in recruiting and retaining commercial and industrial companies and jobs in the Auburn market. They also report to a national audience what citizens say each year in the Annual Citizen Survey – the City of Auburn is a great place to live, work and raise children.

#### **City Responds to Winter Weather**

January's winter weather event left motorists stranded and school children stuck at school across the southeast. In Auburn, conditions were not as severe as Birmingham or Atlanta, but local schools were closed and roads were dangerously icy throughout the city.

As it became apparent that the storm would bring more ice and less snow than had been predicted, City crews escalated their efforts to prepare roads and respond to icy conditions. City crews worked into the night as the freezing rain soaked the roads before a short snow began, setting up conditions for dangerously icy roads and sidewalks.

While icy conditions persisted, Auburn Police responded to 21 accidents, assisted more than 100 motorists including giving rides to stranded motorists, and dealt with approximately 30 additional road hazard complaints. Some stranded motorists were unable to retrieve their cars until icy conditions subsided. Storm conditions and related accidents did not result in any known deaths or serious injury in Auburn.

In addition to the response efforts of Auburn Public Safety, the City's Public Works, Environmental Services, Water Resource Management and Parks and Recreation Departments worked to make conditions safer by spreading sand on local roads and sidewalks, and at city facilities including parking lots, outdoor stairwells and cemetery walkways. Over 170 tons of sand and 3,300 pounds of de-icer were used to combat icy conditions.

Storm response by City crews took hundreds of personhours to complete. The City did not suspend operations during icy conditions, but remained open to provide city services as needed by residents, with only a few services or programs delayed or canceled as dictated by weather conditions. The work done by City employees to respond to storm conditions and maintain city services is a testament to the dedicated men and women whose mission is public service.
