Citizen Survey 2015

The results of the 2015 Citizen Survey were presented to the Auburn City Council at the Tuesday, April 7, 2015 Committee of the Whole meeting. Since 2006, the City's rankings have significantly improved in 50 areas measured with no statistically significant decreases in that time frame. Of those, 21 areas improved by double digits. Auburn also performed well against the national average of cities surveyed. In 2015, Auburn rated above the national average in 59 of 62 areas, with 53 of those areas significantly above average, and 40 areas beating the national average by double digits. Ratings for quality of city services and value received for tax dollars were both 30 points above the national average.

Results were presented by Chris Tatham, President of the ETC Institute, a Kansas based research firm. Tatham began his presentation by summarizing the results of this year's survey with five major findings:

- Residents have a very positive perception of the city
- The city is equitably serving residents in all geographic areas
- The city is moving in the right direction
- The City of Auburn is setting the standard for delivery of city services
- Traffic flow and infrastructure maintenance continue to be the greatest opportunities for improvement

Top Measures

The survey showed that residents feel good about Auburn as a place to live, work and play. Especially notable was the general feeling of safety in the community, with 97% of residents feeling safe in their neighborhood, and 93% feeling the city was safe overall. Ninety-six percent (96%) of respondents ranked Auburn as a "good" or "excellent" place to live.

Eighty-six percent (86%) of residents gave positive ratings to city services, matching last year's alltime high for that measure. Tatham pointed out that there were 43 positive ratings for each negative rating for city services. The ranking for value received for tax dollars and fees (76% "satisfied" or "very satisfied") tells a similar story, with nearly a 13 to 1 ratio of positive to negative responses.

Leadership

Elected officials are also ranked positively by 63% of residents, 16 points above the national average. Residents rank the effectiveness of the City Manager at 67% positive, compared to the national average of 49%. Residents ranked the effectiveness of our various Boards and Commissions 6 points higher than the national average.

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Citizen Survey 2015 (From page 1) Why do we do it?

Throughout the year, elected officials and city staff hear from citizens on issues of importance to them. These communications are a vital part of the city's mission to provide excellent customer service. They inform us of immediate issues to which we need to respond and of the concerns, complaints, ideas and priorities of those citizens.

In contrast, the Citizen Survey gives us the big picture. It allows us to hear from the community as a whole on the city's performance and priorities. It gives us a statistically valid measure of how people rank city services across categories and departments. It also allows us to see how we compare to other cities around the nation so that we can learn from cities that do things particularly well.

Why didn't I receive a citizen survey?

To be scientifically valid, participants in the Citizen Survey must be selected at random. The random sample must be sufficiently large in order to accurately represent the community. Each year, the ETC Institute mails the survey to a random sample of 1,500 households within the City of Auburn. That sample size provides a large enough response for statistical validity at the 95% level of confidence.

Why should we believe the survey results?

Since the survey is conducted using scientific survey principles, it provides a statistically valid measure of public opinion. The 2015 Citizen Survey provided a 95% level of confidence with a precision of plus or minus 3.5%. This means that if the survey were conducted 100 times using 100 different random samples, we would expect to see the same results (plus or minus 3.5%) 95 out of 100 times. By following these scientific principles, we can be confident that the survey accurately measures the general feelings and opinions of the Auburn citizenry. The Citizen Survey is conducted by an independent third party, the ETC Institute, to protect the survey from bias and to provide an independent analysis of the results.

How do we use the survey?

The Citizen Survey allows city leaders to learn how residents rate the city's performance in providing essential city services. The survey results guide the City Council and staff in setting budget, project and policy priorities for each biennial budget. It is crucial to city officials that the voice and opinions of citizens are actively sought out.

John Lankford Appointed Auburn Fire Chief

Auburn City Manager Charles Duggan has accepted the recommendation of Public Safety Director Bill James to appoint John C. Lankford IV as the new Chief of the Auburn Fire Division. Chief Lankford has served in the Auburn Fire Division since 1994, and has been Deputy Chief since 2014. Lankford has led the Fire Division since



the death of former Chief Lee Lamar earlier this year.

"Chief Lankford's 21 years of service, pursuit of educational opportunities, and excellent history of hard work and leadership have given him the experience needed to lead the Auburn Fire Division. I share Public Safety Director Bill James' confidence in John's ability to ensure that the Auburn Fire Division continues to deliver the excellence in fire and emergency response that the Auburn community expects and deserves," said Auburn City Manager Charles Duggan.

Chief Lankford has an Associate of Science degree in Fire Science from Chattahoochee Valley Community College, a Bachelor of Science in Agricultural Business and Economics from Auburn University and is a graduate of the Alabama State Fire College and the National Fire Academy. Chief Lankford has also been an Adjunct Instructor at the Alabama State Fire College and at Southern Union Community College. In addition to his duties at the Auburn Fire Division, Chief Lankford worked with Columbus Fire and EMS and the Southwest Fire Protection Authority. Chief Lankford has pursued extensive professional training from various organizations including the Georgia Fire Academy, the Department of Justice, Emergency Safety and Environmental Training Associates, the National Fire Academy, the National Safety Council, New Mexico Tech and Texas A&M University.

Public Safety Director Bill James said of Lankford, "John has been a leader in the Fire Division during his career and provided excellent leadership during Chief Lamar's illness. I look forward to working with John as he leads the Fire Division into the future."
