2016 Travel With Care Transportation Safety Campaign

Do you know when to go? Travel With Care, established by the City of Auburn and Auburn University to address transportation safety concerns in the Auburn city limits, has launched its 2016 campaign—Know When to Go. This year's campaign focuses on failure to yield and right-of-way in all transportation situations—driving, cycling, walking and riding a transit.

Failing to yield right-of-way is a common issue that can have serious consequences. In fact, in 2013 in the state of Alabama, Failure to Yield Right-of-Way and Failure to Heed Signs & Signals was the number one cause of all reported traffic incidents. That's more than 24,000 crashes!

Know When to Go aims to educate Auburn residents on common yielding situations and how to handle them in a legal, cautious and courteous manner. When you fail to yield right-of-way, you take a risk that puts you and other travelers in potential danger. Whether you're driving, bicycling, walking or riding a transit, it's essential to your well being to know when it's both legal and safe to go.

Bike Month 2016

Bike Month 2016 has come and gone, but brought with it a variety of new local amenities to help Auburn cyclists to Travel with Care:

Bike Racks: Twenty-five bike racks have been installed downtown, replacing the bike racks that were downtown prior to the Corner Construction last year. The new bike racks not only help cyclists securely park their bike for shopping and dining downtown, but they also serve as a way to return War Eagle Bike share bikes. You can learn more about the app-based War Eagle Bike Share program online at gotchabike.com/auburn-university/. The City is currently working with Auburn University on more War Eagle Bike Share partnerships to serve Auburn.



Bike Share: The City also added a 10th bicycle to its free bike share program. The new bicycle is unique in that it has a battery powered electric motor to assist riders on challenging climbs or long rides. Very few

communities have pedal assist bicycles available in their bike share programs. For more information on the City's program, visit auburnalabama.org/cycle.

Bike Repair: Cyclists also now have a new public repair stand available, located downtown near Five Guys. The repair stand has an air pump, tools to help cyclists perform needed repairs while cycling downtown, and is free to any who would use it.

Bike Paths: Finally, Auburn's first bike "sharrow" lanes are striped and open for business. Sharrows refer to arrow-like markings on the roadway that mark shared lanes as a bicycle route. The lane markings are intended to inform cyclists and motorists that a travel lane is shared by both modes of traffic. The goal of sharrows is to create a safer shared travel lane for both motor vehicles and bicycles where dedicated bike lanes are not available. Auburn's first sharrows can be found connecting East University Drive to South College Street via South Donahue Drive and East Longleaf Drive. Additional sharrows are planned for the future to further connect Auburn's comprehensive bicycle network, in keeping with the Bicycle Network Plan.

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Mr. Warren Goes to Washington

Auburn Public Library Director Chris Warren was nominated in March as one of four Librarians to represent Alabama at National Library Legislative Day in Washington, D. C. Warren traveled to Washington in May, at no cost to the City of Auburn, to meet with elected officials to describe the importance of public libraries and their critical role in communities. He was able to use the trip to help highlight the positive impact of public libraries to congressional leaders.



Sales Tax Holiday

Auburn's Sales Tax Holiday Weekend will offer savings for parents sending their children back to school this fall. The tax holiday weekend begins Friday, August 5 and ends on Sunday, August 7 at midnight.

Items exempt from state and city sales tax fall into three major categories as listed below. For a full list, please visit revenue.alabama.gov/salestax/SalesTaxHol.cfm.

Clothing – All apparel suitable for a person's general use is exempt unless it otherwise appears on the taxable list; clothing items must cost \$100 or less per article of clothing to be exempt.

Computers, Computer Software, and School Computer Supplies – A single purchase with a sales price of \$750 or less will be exempt. Exempt items include computers, computer software and any item commonly used by a student in a course of study in which a computer is used.

School Supplies – Any item \$50 or less per item commonly used by a student in a course of study will be exempt. Supplies may include art supplies, reference maps and globes, textbooks on an official school book list with a sales price of more than \$30 but less than \$50, and books with a sales price of \$30 or less per book.

2016 Household Hazardous Waste Day a Success

Nine tons of cleaners, paint and other potentially hazardous chemicals were safely and responsibly disposed of, thanks to the 2016 Household Hazardous Waste Day. Three hundred and six participants provided the largest response to HHW Day since 2011. Residents began to arrive for the event an hour before it began and a steady stream of cars continued throughout the day.

Household Hazardous Waste Day is a partnership with Clean Harbors Environmental. Since it was first offered in 2003, residents have properly disposed of 125 tons of materials. By taking advantage of HHW Day, residents help protect our health and environment by keeping these chemicals out of household garbage, landfills and illegal dumps.

HHW Day is one of several annual events the Environmental Services Department hosts to help residents responsibly and affordably meet their disposal and recycling needs. Other events include Trash Amnesty Week in the Spring, and Electronics Recycling and Document Shredding Day in the Fall.

HR Director Co-Authors Article on City Ethics Training Program

Human Resources Director Steve Reeves recently co-authored an article with William Sauser in the book "Transforming Government Organizations: Fresh Ideas and Examples from the Field." The article, entitled "Maintaining an Ethical Culture in Municipal Government Through the Use of a Professional Ethics Workshop for all City Employees," examines issues of organizational culture and ethics in a municipal workplace, and the efficacy of providing ethics training as a planned and proactive organizational initiative. The City of Auburn has provided such training since 2003, with over 650 employees at all levels receiving the training to date. The City of Auburn's training is conducted by Reeve's co-author, Dr. William Sauser.

This training represents one of the ways the City of Auburn strives to maintain an excellent, dedicated and ethical workforce that Auburn residents can trust.

City of Auburn Mosquito Management Program

The City of Auburn's mosquito management program is designed to combat mosquitoes and the associated risk of viruses such as Zika. However, the first step in mitigating mosquito issues begins with you. Residents are advised to follow recommendations by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) and the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) such as using repellent to ward off mosquitoes, wearing protective clothing and removing standing water from around homes as the most effective ways to ward off mosquitoes.

Homes and Detention Ponds

The City's approach to assisting you in mitigating mosquito issues is to use a combination of spraying to eradicate mature mosquitoes (adulticiding) as well as taking measures to eradicate mosquito larvae (larviciding). To accomplish these goals around Auburn's homes and ponds, the following approaches are taken:


By request, we will set up a time to visit resident properties with a backpack sprayer. Staff will also evaluate the area and recommend ways for homeowners to reduce the mosquito population by removing old tires, buckets and other items that could hold standing water attractive to breeding mosquitos.

On a rotating schedule, City staff will deposit larvicide briquettes into City detention ponds to eradicate mosquito larvae/pupae.

Residents and businesses should also contact local pest control companies for services around their homes to address mosquito problems and concerns.

Citywide Spraying/Fogging

The City also places mosquito traps at various locations to capture a sample of mosquitoes for testing. Experts at Auburn University test these specimens to determine if they are carriers of West Nile, Equine Encephalitis or Zika. If mosquito pools indicate the presence of viruses in the mosquitoes, a truck-mounted sprayer/fogger will be used to spray throughout the City. During the last several years, no viruses have been detected in the local mosquito population, and the fogger truck has not been needed.



Personal Responsibility

AL.com recently published an article on the Zika virus using information from Auburn University's Derrick Mathias, who researches mosquitoes and the Zika Virus. Dr. Mathias also advises the City of Auburn Environmental Services department on our mosquito control efforts. In the article, Dr. Mathias emphasizes that the most effective way to combat the type of mosquitos that may carry the Zika virus "... is simply for property owners to eliminate standing water, scrubbing the sides of containers to remove mosquito eggs." Due to the activity patterns of these mosquitos and the fact that they tend to breed in very small amounts of water, our fogger trucks and other large scale methods are less effective. The article also states that there are no known U.S. cases of mosquito transmission of Zika.
