

Citizen Survey 2016

The results of the 2016 Citizen Survey are in and Auburn is setting the bar when it comes to our citizens' satisfaction with the services they are receiving. Since 2006 the City's rankings have significantly improved in 50 areas. This year's survey results showed Auburn ranking above the national average in 61 of 62 areas, with 53 of those areas significantly above average, and 44 areas beating the national average by double digits. Auburn's rating for the quality of city services ranked 31 points above the national average.

Results were presented to the City Council at the May 3rd Committee of the Whole by Chris Tatham, President of the ETC Institute, a Kansas based research firm. Tatham began his presentation by summarizing the results of this year's survey with five major findings:

- Residents have very positive perceptions of the city
- The city is equitably serving residents in all areas of the city
- The city is moving in the right direction
- The City of Auburn is setting the standard for delivery of city services
- Traffic flow and maintenance of city infrastructure are the top priorities for improvement over the next two years

Top Ratings

Ninety-seven percent (97%) of residents, rated the City as an excellent or good place to live and to raise children. Most residents (92%) generally feel safe in the City and even more (96%) feel safe in their own neighborhoods.

Eighty-six percent (86%) of residents gave positive ratings to overall city services, matching the City's all-time high for that measure. Police, fire and ambulance services led in the services category, with 93% satisfaction. Auburn City Schools also earned high marks, with 90% satisfaction. Especially notable was the ranking for value received for tax dollars and fees, with 75% of residents satisfied or very satisfied, up seven points since 2006 and ranking 30 points above the national average.

Leadership

Auburn's elected officials were ranked 15 points above the national average, and the City Manager was ranked 13 points above the national average. Residents ranked the effectiveness of our various Boards and Commissions 5 points higher than the national average.

Priorities

Traffic flow and maintenance of city infrastructure are top priorities for improvement, with the management of traffic flow and congestion ranking at 45% satisfaction. In 2015, traffic flow and congestion was heavily impacted by a number of traffic enhancement projects at several of Auburn's major intersections including Toomer's Corner, Opelika Road and East University Drive and the intersection of Shug Jordan Parkway and South College Street. These projects were designed to improve both traffic flow and safety at these key Auburn intersections.

Infrastructure projects continue this year, with the replacement of the Moores Mill Bridge over Interstate 85. This project will greatly improve traffic flow in the area when complete, but the construction process will impede traffic for many months to come. Residents are advised to cross the Interstate at Bent Creek Road and Wrights Mill Road during construction.

Residents are already responding favorably to the infrastructure improvements stemming from the Renew Opelika Road initiative. Satisfaction with the appearance of Opelika Road is up 20 points after the completion of streetscape improvements near the post office and intersection and streetscape improvements near the Auburn Mall.

Why do we do it?

The City of Auburn is committed to strong citizen participation in local government. The Annual Citizen Survey, first conducted in 1986, has been administered every year since 1988. The Survey allows City leaders to hear from the community as a whole on the city's performance and priorities. It provides a statistically valid measure of how people rank city services across categories and departments, and benchmarks Auburn against other cities around the nation.

Who Receives a Citizen Survey?

To be scientifically valid, participants in the Citizen Survey are selected at random. The random sample must be large enough to accurately represent the community. Each year, the ETC Institute mails the survey to a random sample of 2,500 households within the City of Auburn. That sample size provides a large enough response for the survey to be statistically valid, as explained below.


How Accurate are the Survey Results?

Since the survey is conducted using scientific survey principles, it provides a statistically valid measure of public opinion. The 2016 Citizen Survey provided a 95% level of confidence with a precision of plus or minus 3.5%. This means that if the survey were conducted 100 times using 100 different random samples, it would show the same results (plus or minus 3.5%) 95 out of 100 times. By following these scientific principles, we can be confident that the survey accurately measures the feelings and opinions of the Auburn citizenry. The Citizen Survey is conducted by an independent third party, the ETC Institute, to protect the survey from bias and to provide an independent analysis of the results.

How do we use the survey?

The survey results guide the City Council and staff in setting budget, project and policy priorities for each biennial budget. It is crucial to city officials that the voice and opinions of citizens are actively sought out.

Moores Mill Bridge Update

Work is underway on the Moores Mill Bridge replacement project. The project is managed by the Alabama Department of Transportation. During construction, left turns are limited at the intersection of East University Drive and Moores Mill Road. Detour signs are posted at appropriate locations.

As this update is written, the project is in "Phase 2," and the contractor has shifted traffic lanes to work on water lines, storm sewer pipes and storm sewer structures. Part of this phase of the project will include widening Moores Mill Road from east of Grove Hill Road and widening and restriping Grove Hill Road leading up to its intersection with Moores Mill Road. Phase 2 also includes construction on the west (Montgomery) side of the new bridge, including the multi-use path connecting to Moores Mill Park. This phase of construction will be underway for the rest of 2016, if not into 2017.
