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City of Auburn

Excellent bond rating means better use of citizen tax dollars

At the corner of Magnolia Avenue and Ross Street, the foundation is being laid for the new Public Safety Complex that will house the City of Auburn's police, fire and judicial services. This 70,502-square-foot, state-of-the-art facility will serve the Auburn community into the next century.

Before a single shovel full of dirt could be turned, the City of Auburn had to issue bonds to pay for the \$33 million project. We received a very favorable interest rate of 3.7 percent for this issuance, thanks to our excellent credit rating, helping ensure more money goes toward projects and less money goes into interest payments.

This spring, the City of Auburn's credit worthiness was determined by Standard & Poor (S&P) and Moody's Investors Service, the top two bond rating agencies in the nation. We received an Aa2 rating from Moody's, only two steps from the top of Moody's scale, and an AA+ rating from S&P, just one step from the top.

These ratings are a tool outside investors, who often know little about Auburn or our area, use to determine whether we're reliable and worth the investment. High ratings show that our local government is financially stable, well-managed and has a solid trajectory. Because of these factors, investors consider us less of a risk and offer us lower interest rates.

"It is important to maintain strong ratings," said Finance Director Penny Smith. "We want to have the best rating that we possibly can because that means more money back into the pocketbooks of the City. We also have lots of banks that invest in us locally, and they look to this rating to decide whether we're a good investment."

Rating agencies determine ratings using metrics such as an organization's debt ratio, liquidity and financial management. They also take into account presentations from City officials, which we make each time we're seeking a large issuance, that help convey the City's overall financial picture. Regularly, the City of Auburn returns from presentations with high reviews from our raters, and other municipalities often call asking for tips on creating great presentations.

"The high ratings we get from our raters come from the fact that we're prepared," Smith said. "What I always say is, we make a plan, and we do what we say we're going to do. The rating agencies like to see stability—they don't want to see surprises. We are very well thought of nationally from that standpoint."

These high bond ratings aren't new for the City of Auburn. We've remained in the top tier of rating agencies' scales for decades thanks to the work that City of Auburn employees do every day. From keeping track of monthly records and producing annual reports to receiving the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting from the Government Finance Officers Association for 30 years-it all plays a part in making sure rating agencies can see that the City of Auburn's finances are wellmanaged.



What you need to know about the 2018 Municipal Election

The City of Auburn's 2018 Municipal Election is coming up on Aug. 28, 2018. All positions on the Auburn City Council are up for election, including mayor. All registered and qualified electors of the state who reside within Auburn City limits, and who have resided within City limits for 30 days or more immediately preceding the election date, are authorized to vote in the election.

Polling locations

Please note that all Ward 2 residents will now vote at the Boykin Community Center rather than the National Guard Armory. On June 5, the Council approved an ordinance changing the polling location for Ward 2 since the armory is unavailable during renovations. This will make the City's polling locations more consistent since Ward 1 and Ward 2 were the only wards without a combined voting location.

Lee County already took action to move from the armory to Boykin for the June 5 primary election, so this change will be consistent for Municipal elections and elections held by the County. While the facility was busy during the June 5 election, there was sufficient parking at the facility, which has as much or more parking than some of our other polling locations.

Polls will be open at the following locations from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 28:

- Ward 4 (District 2, Post 2): Frank Brown Recreation Center, 235 Opelika Road
- Ward 5 (District 3, Post 1): Dean Road Recreation Center, 307 S. Dean Road
- Ward 6 (District 3, Post 2): Dean Road Recreation Center, 307 S. Dean Road
- Ward 7 (District 4, Post 1): Clarion Inn and Suites, 1577 S. College St.
- Ward 8 (District 4, Post 2): Clarion Inn and Suites, 1577 S. College St.
- Absentee Box: Auburn City Hall

Voter registration

The deadline to register to vote is Friday, Aug. 17. Voters may register with the Lee County Board of Registrars at the Lee County Courthouse, 215 S. 9th St. in Opelika, or online at alabamavotes.gov. Voters may also print a registration form at alabamavotes.gov, fill it out and mail it to the Lee County Board of Registrars at PO Box 1530, Opelika, AL, 36803. To find out whether you're registered to vote, visit myinfo.alabamavotes.gov and click on "Registration Information."

Absentee voting

If you are unable to vote at the polls on Election Day, you may apply for an absentee ballot if:

- You will be out of the county on Election Day;
- You have a physical illness or disability that prevents a trip to the polling place;

- You are a registered voter living outside of the county, such as a member of the armed forces, a voter employed outside the United States, a college student or a spouse or child of such a person;
- You are an appointed election official or poll watcher at a polling place other than your regular polling place;
- You work a required shift of at least 10 hours that coincides with polling hours.

Applying for absentee voting

The City will accept applications for absentee ballots through Thursday, Aug. 23. Applications may be obtained from City Hall. Applications must be made in writing to the City Manager and either hand delivered by the voter or mailed to Auburn City Hall, Attn: Absentee Ballots, 144 Tichenor Ave., Suite 1, Auburn, AL, 36830.


The application must be signed by the applicant and state the applicant's name, address, information necessary to verify the applicant as a registered voter and the address to which the ballot should be mailed. Absentee ballots will be mailed to those persons who have made a proper application.

Business Emergency or Medical Emergency applications may be made after the absentee deadline but no later than 5 p.m. on the day before the election if the voter:

- Is required by an employer under unforeseen circumstances to be out of the county on election day for an emergency business trip, or
- Has a medical emergency requiring treatment from a licensed physician.

Absentee voting deadlines

Absentee ballots returned by mail must be postmarked no later than the day prior to the election and received by the absentee election manager no later than noon on Election Day. If hand delivered by the voter, the ballot must be in the office of the absentee election manager at 144 Tichenor Ave. in Auburn by the close of business at 5 p.m. on the day before the election.



2018 Sales Tax Holiday set for July 20-22

As families and children get ready to stock up on loose-leaf paper and pencils, remember the 2018 Back to School Sales Tax Holiday is set for July 20-22. On April 17, the Auburn City Council approved an ordinance exempting specific items from the City's 4 percent sales tax, including clothing less than \$100 per article; computers, computer software and school computer supplies \$750 or less; school supplies less than \$50; textbooks with a sales price of more than \$30 and less than \$50; and books less than \$30.
